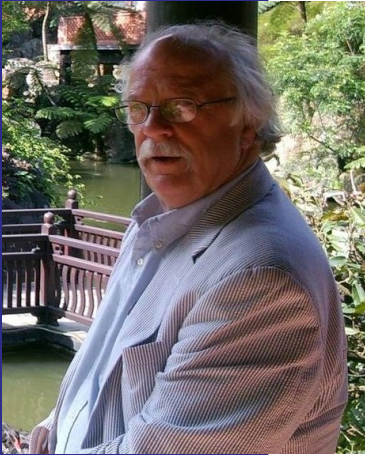

2022 Division of Policing Award Winners

Lifetime Achievement Award



Peter Manning is a senior Fellow at the Garfinkel Archive and a senior Fellow of the Yale Ethnography Project. He received his Ph.D. from Duke University in 1966, and his MA from University of Oxford in 1982. He has taught at Michigan State, Victoria University in British Columbia, MIT, Oxford, the University of Michigan, and the Education University of Hong Kong. He served as a

Fellow of the National Institute of Justice, Balliol and Wolfson Colleges, Oxford, the American Bar Foundation, the Rockefeller Villa (Bellagio), and the Centre for Socio-Legal Studies, Wolfson College, Oxford. His work is available in Italian, Russian, and Spanish and reprinted many times. He authored or edited 19 books including: *Police Work*

(MIT Press, 1974) and *Democratic Policing in a Changing World* (Paradigm 2010). His forthcoming book is an ethnographic study: *The Police and the Other: the Drama of Policing Ireland*.

Distinguished Scholar Award



Christopher S. Koper is a Professor in the Department of Criminology, Law and Society at George Mason University and the Principal Fellow of George Mason's Center for Evidence-Based Crime Policy. He earned his Ph.D. in criminology and criminal justice from the University of Maryland in 1995 and held research positions at several non-profit think tanks and universities prior to joining the faculty of George Mason in 2011. Much of Dr.

Koper's research focuses on place-based crime control strategies, police technology, and the institutionalization of evidence-based practices. His work on patrolling crime hot spots (often referred to as the "Koper curve" principle) is used by police agencies around the world, and he is the co-developer of the Evidence-Based Policing Matrix tool for policy translation of research on police crime control strategies. Dr. Koper has also conducted

extensive research on firearms policy (most notably, regulation of assault weapons), illegal firearms markets, and firearms-focused policing strategies. Dr. Koper is a fellow of the Academy of Experimental Criminology, the co-editor of *Criminology & Public Policy*, and co-author of the award-winning book, *Evidence-Based Policing: Translating Research into Practice*.

Early Career Scholar Award



Natalie Todak is an Associate Professor of Criminal Justice at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. She uses qualitative and mixed research methods to study critical issues in policing. Her work is currently focused on police diversity, culture, misconduct, and whistleblowing. She is a National Institute of Justice LEADS Academic, in recognition of her collaborative work with

agencies to further evidence-based policing.

Outstanding Practitioner Award



Stephen A. Bishopp is a lieutenant and 32-year veteran of the Dallas Police Department. He received his Ph.D. (2013) in Criminology from the University of Texas at Dallas. Steve is the commander of the Data Analysis & Management Unit—Intelligence Division. In this role, he oversees the Dallas Police Department's UCR/NIBRS, Staff Review, and Crime Analysis units. Steve's research interests include evidence-based

policing, use-of-force, police mental health/well-being, and criminological theory. His most recent publications appear in prestigious journals such as *Justice Quarterly*, *Crime & Delinquency*, *Policing: An International Journal*, *Justice Research & Practice*, *Injury Prevention*, *American Journal of Public Health*, *Journal of Public Health*, *Deviant Behavior*, and *Police Quarterly*. Steve

has been an invited speaker for the FLETC Summit on Trending Issues in Policing (2016), the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police-Mental Health Commission of Canada conference in Gatineau, Ontario (2017), and a panel moderator for the inaugural Australian Federal Police symposium "At What Cost?" held in Washington, D.C., (2017).

Outstanding Student Article Award



Scott Mourtgos is a Ph.D. Candidate in the Political Science Department at the University of Utah and a National Institute of Justice LEADS scholar. Scott received a Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice from Weber State University and a Master's degree in Forensic Psychology from the University of North Dakota. After completing his undergraduate degree, Scott became a police officer and

is now a police executive with nearly two decades of professional experience. As a researcher, Scott focuses on policing and criminal justice policy. His interests are wide-ranging, including public perception of police and the criminal justice system, use-of-force, deterrence theory, sexual assault investigations, personnel issues, and

program evaluation. Underlying these interests is a focus on quantitative methods, especially Bayesian techniques. Scott's recent work has appeared in *Criminology & Public Policy*, *Justice Quarterly*, *Journal of Criminal Justice*, and other journals. Scott also serves on the Police Executive Research Forum's (PERF) Research Advisory Board.

Outstanding Dissertation Award



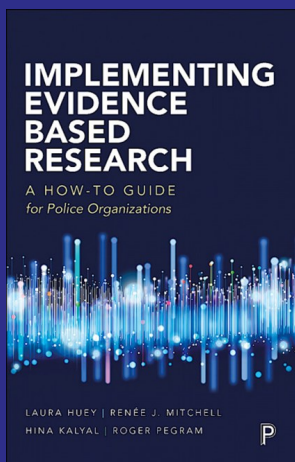
Carlena Orosco received her doctorate from the School of Criminology and Criminal Justice at Arizona State University. Her dissertation research focused on the strategies and techniques police dispatchers use to de-escalate callers and officers in the field. She previously served as the Research and Planning Supervisor in the Strategic Planning, Analysis & Research Center (SPARC) at Tempe Police Department. Prior to joining Tempe PD, she worked as a Senior Research Analyst for

the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission, Statistical Analysis Center. Carlena's research spans numerous content areas, including de-escalation in policing, police dispatchers, crime analysis, and law enforcement decision-making. Additionally, she worked for nine years as a dispatcher for the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, where she was also an Acting Supervisor and Systems Monitor. Carlena's subject-matter expertise in policing and crime analysis also led

to her selection as a trainer for the UN-led effort to provide crime analysis instruction to new Crime Analysts in the Caribbean. Carlena's work can be found in *Policing: An International Journal*, *Policing: A Journal of Policy and Practice*, *American Journal of Public Health*, and *Justice Quarterly*.

Laura Huey, Renee Mitchell, Hina Kalyal, and Roger Pegram for their book, *Implementing Evidence Based Research: A How-to Guide for Police Organizations*. When it comes to adopting evidence-based approaches, does the size of an organization really matter? This practical guide brings leading police and sociology experts together to demonstrate how police forces of all sizes can successfully embed evidence-based methods by using their strengths and

limitations to their advantage. Drawing on experiences of policing in North America, it proposes new ways of strategizing and harnessing the talents of 'change champions'. Building on the authors' widely adopted first book on evidence-based policing, this is essential reading for practitioners, aspiring leaders, students and policy-makers.

Meet our New Executive Board

Chair: Carol A. Archbold is a Walter F. and Verna Gehrts Endowed Professor and Chair of the Department of Criminal Justice at North Dakota State University in Fargo, ND. She teaches graduate and undergraduate courses focused on policing and research methods. Her research interests include police accountability, liability and misconduct, risk management in policing, and women and policing. Dr. Archbold has published her research in a variety of criminal justice and police journals and has authored or co-authored five books centered on policing issues.

Vice Chair: Janne E. Gaub is an assistant professor of criminal justice and criminology at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte. She received her PhD in Criminology and Criminal Justice from Arizona State University in 2015. Her research interests include body-worn cameras, specialized police units, police misconduct, and representation in policing. She has previously served on the Division of Policing Awards and Social Media Committees.

Secretary/ Treasurer: Lisa Barao is an Assistant Professor at Westfield State University and a Research Fellow with Crime and Justice Policy Lab. She earned her Ph.D. in Criminology & Justice Policy from Northeastern University. She teaches topics in law enforcement, the administration of justice, and evidence-based policing. Her research interests focus on crime prevention and violence reduction strategies, the evaluation of law enforcement technologies, and issues in the police organizational culture. She has worked on projects with several police agencies located in Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York, and California.

Executive Counselors:

Jacqueline Drew is a Senior Lecturer in the School of Criminology and Criminal Justice and the Griffith Criminology Institute, Griffith University Australia. She is trained as an Organizational Psychologist and focuses on the organizational experiences of police, particularly the mental health of personnel. She was most recently awarded a federal research grant (Australian Research Council) working with the Queensland Police Chief to develop an early warning system for workplace health and wellbeing. She was also awarded an ARC Grant, focusing on gender equity in policing across Australia and New Zealand.

Connie Koski is a retired police officer from the Ypsilanti, MI Police Department, having served in multiple capacities including patrol, field training officer, and major crimes detective. Currently, she is an Associate Professor of Social Science at Oglala Lakota College in Kyle, SD. She received her doctorate from University of Nebraska Omaha in 2013. She was also selected as recipient of the 2015 ACJS Sage Junior Faculty Professional Development Teaching Award. Her research interests include many aspects of ethical policing, policing of immigration, and criminal justice pedagogy. She has published in the Journal of Criminal Justice Education, Journal of Criminal Justice, Police Practice and Research: An International Journal, The Criminologist, and elsewhere.

Samantha Clinkinbeard is an Associate Professor and the Undergraduate Program Coordinator (Lincoln & Omaha campus) in the School of Criminology and Criminal Justice. Currently, her research is focused on women in policing, including the presence of masculinity and issues surrounding recruitment and retention. She was awarded honorable mention by ASC's Division of Women and Crime for the best Article of the Year in Feminist Criminology for 2017. Her work appears in Criminal Justice & Behavior, Feminist Criminology, Journal of Criminal Justice, Journal of Youth & Adolescence, Youth & Society, and Justice Quarterly. She has taught a variety of courses though most often teaches research methods courses. She was recognized with the CPACS Alumni Outstanding Teaching Award in 2020.
